### Aims

- To become familiar with surrounding weather and temperature conditions

## Survey preparation

Please ensure you have completed the 'School Grounds and Habitat' survey (S1) and recorded the coordinates of your school and the measurements of your school grounds.

1. Record the date on which the survey was completed (e.g. 01/01/21)



2. Record the time that you started the survey (e.g. 10:25 AM)



3. Circle the symbol which best describes the weather today.

4. What is the temperature at the moment?



5. How windy is it at the moment?

### Survey method

#### Steps

- 1. Please walk around your school ground site for 10 minutes in your small groups.
- 2. Use binoculars if you have any handy!
- 3. Please remember to keep quiet so as not to disturb the birds.

4. Why not try to stop and listen, looking straight ahead for a few seconds at each tree or bush to see if any birds are moving.

5. Please **only** record birds within your school grounds.

6. Allocate one person in your team to be the 'photographer' and take photos of the birds. You can zoom in later in the classroom if you need help to identify species.

- 7. Allocate one person in your team to be the 'artist' to sketch/describe 'other birds'.
- 8. Remaining team members are 'spotters' looking and listening for birds.
- 9. Take a photograph of the site that you walked around during the survey.

### **Recording sheet**

- Please record all identified birds on this form.
- Remember to only count each individual bird once.
- If possible, please a tally count of each individual bird you see (see example below).
- If you are not able to count individual birds but did see a given species, please just put a tick inside the relevant box (see example below).
- If you see a bird not on this list, have a go at drawing/describing it and write down its name if you know it in the description column. See guidance for further help.
