

# Festive star decoration

Subject: Art and Design

### Overview

• This festive art activity can be adapted in many ways to link to the curriculum, whilst also encouraging teamwork and learning a new skill of knot tying.

### Learning Outcomes

- To use design skills and a variety of materials to create a six pointed star festive decoration.
- To learn how to tie a square lashing knot

## Equipment

- Sticks (roughly the same length) or lolly sticks
- String, wool, thread, or ribbon
- Glue (glue gun with supervision)
- Scissors

# Activity

- 1. Take the pupils out on a walk to collect their sticks. They will need to find six sticks that are similar in length.
- 2. Watch a video tutorial that demonstrates how to tie a square lashing. There are lots of examples but we like **this one on YouTube**.
- 3. Working in pairs, one pupil crosses two sticks to make two sides of a triangle.
- **4**. Using string, the other pupil should cross lash the sticks together.
- 5. Add the third stick to make a triangle, lashing both ends together.
- 6. The pairs can swap roles and repeat this to make another triangle.

- 7. To make a star, place one triangle on top of the other and glue or lash them in place (a hot glue gun is handy for this stage).
- 8. Encourage pupils to decorate their star using string, wool, fabric shapes or sparkly decorations.
- 9. Ribbon or string can be used to attach a loop to hang the stars up.
