Funding for Outdoor Learning

Planning your fundraising

There are a range of ways you can find funds or other resources to support your school grounds project, from PTA fundraisers to gifts in kind from local shops and businesses, from volunteer time to applications for grants. In this information sheet we focus on the latter – where you might go to apply for funding from trusts and others who provide funding to schools.

Before you apply here are a few key pointers to help you have the best chance of success:

- Look locally there may well be local companies, supermarkets and trusts that you can apply to. Many funders like to give back to their local communities and schools can be seen as being at the heart of that community.
- Identify a need funders like to show that their money is doing good so help them to see what difference their money will make. You may need to support your application with evidence of what your project is designed to achieve. Our website has a <u>whole section on evidence</u> so do see if there is something there that will help support your case.
- Keep information about your project your vision, your aims, what you have achieved to date so that funders can see where you have come from and where you are aiming to reach. Photographs also really help you tell your story.
- Check the criteria of the grant you are hoping to apply for do not waste your time on something that might fit if you push it hard and do really focus on what their priorities are in your application.
- Make sure you have a realistic budget funders want to know that their money is being spent well.
- Do find out how many applications they are likely to get and how many grants they are giving out so you know where to put your energy.
- Read your application back to yourself many times even better, get someone else to read it through together with the criteria for the grant. This will help you to see what the person reading your application will see. A second set of eyes will help you spot typos and spelling mistakes!
- Use your pupils' voices they are the best at telling your story so use quotes from them about what the project means to them. Engage them to develop your project ideas too many funders like to see how you have consulted with your audience.
- Celebrate success! Invite funders, especially if they are local, to see what you have done and to thank them. Building a relationship with a funder will help you obtain more funding in the future.



Sources of funds

Our own <u>LtL Local Schools Nature Grants</u> - offering training and equipment to support outdoor learning in schools.

In England or Wales, you can use your <u>Sports Premium Funding</u>. All schools receive £16,000 plus £10 per pupil annually. Ofsted will be looking for impact that the money brings, this includes 'Embedding physical activity into the school day through an active playground'.

Company Match funding or Company Giving – many companies will donate items, labour or small amounts of money to local schemes. There is often a 'payback' needed such as a nice newspaper article or a plaque from a sponsor. Work out who your local companies are and get pupils to write to them asking for specific items such as trees, labour to build a new path or clothing. We have examples of companies as diverse as Starbucks, B&Q, Scottish Hydro, Jewsons and Royal Bank of Scotland donating items or time to school grounds improvements.

<u>Tesco</u>	Up to £1,500	UK-wide	Applications are open to all local good causes, but currently prioritising helping projects that support food security, children and young people and local store nominated good causes.
<u>BBC Children in Need</u>	Various	UK-wide	Several funding programmes open at any one time. Before you apply, it is important that you choose the one which is right for you and your organisation.
<u>Screwfix</u>	Up to £5,000	UK-wide	Supports projects focussed on improvement of community facilities and deprived communities. Ideal for schools with open grounds or 'stay and play' opportunities.
National Lottery	From £300 to £1M	UK-wide	Various projects across the UK. Check out the website for projects available.
The Wolfson Foundation	Up to £100,000	UK-wide	Allocates grants to secondary schools, with a focus on science and technology or special schools (under the Health and Disability programme). They have funded outdoor learning environments and resources.
<u>The Finnis Scott</u> <u>Foundation</u>	Up to £10,000	UK-wide	Grants of up to £10,000, but usually around £5,000 to registered charities with a horticultural focus. PTAs can apply.
<u>Nineveh Charitable</u> <u>Trust</u>	Up to £10,000	UK-wide	Supports projects and activities that educate children, young people, and the local community about the environment, conservation, and the countryside.
<u>Woodland Trust</u>	Free packs	UK-wide	A wide range of tree packs available including hedge, copse, blossom and wild wood.
International Tree Foundation	Up to £6,000	UK-wide	Programme supports grassroots community engagement in tree planting, from community orchards to native woodland planting.



<u>The Tree Council</u>	Free packs	UK-wide	Free orchard tree and hedgerow packs to inspire teachers and pupils across the country to get outdoors to connect, learn about, plant and care for trees.
<u>Wooden Spoon Grant</u>	Up to £5,000	UK-wide	Projects that make a positive impact on children and young people's lives, including a focus on health and wellbeing and outdoor learning projects.
<u>The Royal Society</u>	Up to £3,000	UK-wide	Grants available for STEM projects run at a primary or secondary school or college in partnership with a professional scientist or engineer.
<u>Edina Trust</u>	Up to £700 per year for 3 years	UK-wide, specific areas	Non-competitive grant scheme for various areas across the UK. Grant paid for 3 years. Schools can use their grants for science resources and improving school grounds for science.
Field Studies Council	Up to £2,500 per year for 3 years	England, Scotland, Wales	Provides grants to enable school visits to their facilities.
Morrisons Foundation	Up to £25,000	England, Scotland, Wales	Grants to registered charities. Previous successful applications have included funding for improving play areas and other outdoor areas.

<u>Historic Environment</u> <u>Scotland</u>	Free entry and travel subsidy	Scotland	Travel subsidy and free entry for historical learning visits.
